Directors' Report

The directors of the Company are pleased to present their review along with the interim financial statements of the Company for the half-year ending on 31 December, 2020.

Operational Results

Pakistan's economy started to show positive signs during first half of FY 2020-21. There was a notable pickup in economic activities, as large-scale manufacturing (LSM) gained traction, demand indicators recorded encouraging growth, and all major crops, except cotton, have shown increased production. Industry overall, managed accelerated financial performance due to low interest rates, Government grants and reliefs to various sectors. Specially, incentives announced for Construction sector helped allied industries to gain momentum in business activities resulting in positive signs of recovery.

During first half of the year, your Company achieved 11% growth in Net Sales and reported at Rs. 2,708 million as compared to Rs. 2,444 million in the same period of last year. Gross profit of the Company grew to Rs. 621 million against Rs. 505 million for the corresponding period.

Administrative expenditure were at Rs. 87.197 million compared to Rs. 86.561 million in the same period last year after inflationary increase in expenses, while marketing activities were carried out in line with marketing plan. Reduction in Financial cost contributed positively by adding Rs.37 million in profitability.

The Company reported after tax profit of Rs.102 million compared to Rs. 41 million for the corresponding period of the previous year.

Future Outlook

Despite tough competition and increasing trend in input costs we are confident that the growth pattern witnessed during this period, will continue in remaining part of the year.

The Directors take this opportunity of thanking our shareholders and valued customers for their continued trust and appreciate the dedication demonstrated by all tiers of the Company's staff.

آپ کی کمپنی کے ڈائریکٹرز 31 دسمبر، 2020 کو اختتام پذیر ہونے والے نصف سال پر عبوری فینانشل اسٹیٹمنٹس بمعہ اپنے تبصرے کے بخوشی پیش کرتے ہیں۔

آپریشنل نتائج

مالی سال 2020-21 کی پہلی ششماہی کے دوران پاکستان کی معیشت نے مثبت علامات ظاہر کرنا شروع کر دیں تھیں۔ معاشی سرگرمیوں میں قابل ذکر اضافہ دیکھا گیا اور بڑے پیمانے پر مینوفیکچرنگ (ایل ایس ایم) سمیت ڈیمانڈ میں حوصلہ افزائی کو ریکارڈ کیا گیا، اور کپاس کے علاوہ تمام بڑی فصلوں نے پیداوار میں اضافہ دکھایا ہے۔

شعبہ صنعت میں کئی طور پر مالی اضافہ یکے میں آیا اس کی وجہ شرح سود میں کمی اور حکومت کی مختلف شعبہ جات میں گرانٹز ہیں۔ خصوصاً تعمیراتی شعبہ اور منسلک انڈسٹری کیلئے مثبت اقدامات کی وجہ سے کاروباری سرگرمیوں میں بحالی کا سبب بنی۔

سال کی پہلی ششماہی کے دوران آپ کی کمپنی نے نیٹ سیلز میں 11 فیصد اضافہ حاصل کیا اور 2,708 ملین روپے کے مقابلے میں پچھلے سال کی اسی مدت میں 2,444 ملین روپے رہی۔ کمپنی کا مجموعی منافع 621 ملین روپے رہا جو کہ گزشتہ سال کی اسی مدت کے لئے 505 ملین تھا۔

انتظامی اخراجات مہنگائی کے اضافے کے بعد گزشتہ سال کی اسی مدت کے 86.561 ملین روپے کے مقابلے میں 87.197 ملین روپے رہے۔ جبکہ مارکیٹنگ کی سرگرمیاں مارکیٹنگ کی منصوبہ بندی کے مطابق انجام دی گئیں۔ مالی لاگت میں تخفیف نے منافع میں 37 ملین روپے کا اضافہ کر کے مثبت کردار ادا کیا۔

کمپنی نے گزشتہ سال کی اسی مدت کے 41 ملین روپے کے منافع کے مقابلے میں 102 ملین روپے کا منافع حاصل کیا۔

To the members of Berger Paints Pakistan Limited

Report on Review of Condensed Interim Unconsolidated Financial Statements

Introduction

We have reviewed the accompanying condensed interim unconsolidated statement of financial position of **Berger Paints Pakistan Limited ("the Company")** as at 31 December 2020 and the related condensed interim unconsolidated statement of profit or loss and condensed interim unconsolidated statement of comprehensive income, condensed interim unconsolidated statement of cash flows, condensed interim unconsolidated statement of changes in equity and notes to the condensed interim unconsolidated financial statements for the six-months period then ended (here-in-after referred to as "interim financial statements"). Management is responsible for the preparation and presentation of these condensed interim unconsolidated financial statements in accordance with accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan for interim financial reporting. Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on these financial statements based on our review.

Scope of review

A review of interim financial statements consists of making inquiries, primarily of persons responsible for financial and accounting matters, and applying analytical and other review procedures. A review is substantially less in scope than an audit conducted in accordance with International Standards on Auditing and consequently does not enable us to obtain assurance that we would become aware of all significant matters that might be identified in an audit. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion.

Conclusion

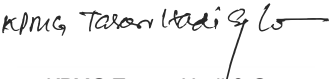

Notes to the Condensed Interim Unconsolidated Financial Statements (Un-audited)

For the half year ended 31 December 2020

1 Reporting entity

Berger Paints Pakistan Limited ("the Company") was incorporated in Pakistan on 25 March 1950 as a private limited company under the Companies Act 1913 (now Companies Act, 2017) and was subsequently converted into a public limited Company. The Company is listed on the Pakistan Stock Exchange ("PSX"). The principle business activity of the Company is manufacturing and trading of paints, varnishes and other related items. Slotrapid Limited, based in British Virgin Island is the Holding Company. The registered office of the Company is situated at 36-Industrial Estate Kot-Lakhpur, Lahore and the principal manufacturing facility of the Company is located at 28 Km Multan Road, Lahore.

2 Basis of preparation

2.1 Statement of compliance

These condensed interim unconsolidated financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan for interim financial reporting. The accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan for interim financial reporting comprise of:

- International Accounting Standard (IAS) 34 - Interim Financial Reporting, issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) as notified under the Companies Act, 2017;
- Islamic Financial Accounting Standards (IFAS) issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Pakistan as notified under the Companies Act, 2017; and
- Provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017.

Where the provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017 differ with the requirements of IAS 34 or IFAS, the provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017 have been followed.

The condensed interim unconsolidated financial statements does not include information required for full annual financial statements and should be read in conjunction with the audited annual financial statements of the Company for the year ended 30 June 2020.

These condensed interim unconsolidated financial statements are being submitted to the shareholders as required by section 237 of the Companies Act, 2017 and the Rule Book of Pakistan Stock Exchange Limited.

The comparative statement of financial position presented in these condensed interim unconsolidated financial statements has been extracted from the audited annual unconsolidated financial statements of the Company for the year ended 30 June 2020, whereas comparative condensed interim unconsolidated statement of profit or loss, condensed interim unconsolidated statement of comprehensive income, condensed interim unconsolidated statement of changes in equity and condensed interim unconsolidated statement of cash flows have been extracted from the un-audited condensed interim unconsolidated financial statements of the Company for the half year ended 31 December 2019.

2.2 Basis of measurement

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for certain employee retirement benefits and lease liabilities which are stated at present value.

2.3 Functional and presentation currency

These condensed interim financial statements are presented in Pak Rupees which is also the Company's functional currency.

3 Use of estimates and judgments

The preparation of the condensed interim unconsolidated financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates. In preparing the condensed interim unconsolidated financial statements, the significant judgments made by the management in applying accounting policies and the key sources of estimates were the same as those applied to the annual unconsolidated financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2020.

4 Summary of significant accounting policies

4.1 The accounting policies and the methods of computation adopted in the preparation of these condensed interim unconsolidated financial statements are same as those applied in the preparation of the annual audited unconsolidated financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2020.

4.2 Standards, interpretations and amendments to published approved accounting standards that are not yet effective

The following International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS Standards) as notified under the Companies Act, 2017 and the amendments and interpretations thereto will be effective for accounting periods beginning on or after 01 January 2021 are not likely to have a significant impact on the financial statements of the Company:

- Interest Rate Benchmark Reform – Phase 2 which amended IFRS 9, IAS 39, IFRS 7, IFRS 4 and IFRS 16 is applicable for annual financial periods beginning on or after 01 January 2021, with earlier application permitted. The amendments introduce a practical expedient to account for modifications of financial assets or financial liabilities if a change results directly from IBOR reform and occurs on an 'economically equivalent' basis. In these cases, changes will be accounted for by updating the effective interest rate. A similar practical expedient will apply under IFRS 16 for lessees when accounting for lease modifications required by IBOR reform. The amendments also allow a series of exemptions from the regular, strict rules around hedge accounting for hedging relationships directly affected by the interest rate benchmark reforms. The amendments apply retrospectively with earlier application permitted. Hedging relationships previously discontinued solely because of changes resulting from the reform will be reinstated if certain conditions are met.

- Onerous Contracts – Cost of Fulfilling a Contract (Amendments to IAS 37) effective for the annual period beginning on or after 01 January 2022 amends IAS 1 by mainly adding paragraphs which clarifies what comprise the cost of fulfilling a contract, Cost of fulfilling a contract is relevant when determining whether a contract is onerous. An entity is required to apply the amendments to contracts for which it has not yet fulfilled all its obligations at the beginning of the annual reporting period in which it first applies the amendments (the date of initial application). Restatement of comparative information is not required, instead the amendments require an entity to recognize the cumulative effect of initially applying the amendments as an adjustment to the opening balance of retained earnings or other component of equity, as appropriate, at the date of initial application.

- Annual Improvements to IFRS standards 2018-2020:

The following annual improvements to IFRS standards 2018-2020 are effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 01 January 2022.

- IFRS 9 – The amendment clarifies that an entity includes only fees paid or received between the entity (the borrower) and the lender, including fees paid or received by either the entity or the lender on the other's behalf, when it applies the '10 per cent' test in paragraph B3.3.6 of IFRS 9 in assessing whether to derecognize a financial liability.
- IFRS 16 – The amendment partially amends Illustrative Example 13 accompanying IFRS 16 by excluding the illustration of reimbursement of leasehold improvements by the lessor. The objective of the amendment is to resolve any potential confusion that might arise in lease incentives.
- IAS 41 – The amendment removes the requirement in paragraph 22 of IAS 41 for entities to exclude taxation cash flows when measuring the fair value of a biological asset using a present value technique
- Sale or Contribution of Assets between an Investor and its Associate or Joint Venture (Amendments to IFRS 10 and IAS 28) – The amendment amends accounting treatment on loss of control of business or assets. The amendments also introduce new accounting for less frequent transaction that involves neither cost nor full step-up of certain retained interests in assets that are not businesses. The effective date for these changes has been deferred indefinitely until the completion of a broader review.
- Property, Plant and Equipment: Proceeds before Intended Use (Amendments to IAS 16) effective for the annual period beginning on or after 1 January 2022. Clarifies that sales proceeds and cost of items produced while bringing an item of property, plant and equipment to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by management e.g. when testing etc., are recognized in profit or loss in accordance with applicable Standards. The entity measures the cost of those items applying the measurement requirements of IAS 2. The standard also removes the requirement of deducting the net sales proceeds from cost of testing. - Reference to the Conceptual Framework (Amendments to IFRS 3) - Reference to the Conceptual Framework, issued in May 2020, amended paragraphs 11, 14, 21, 22 and 23 of and added paragraphs 21A, 21B, 21C and 23A to IFRS 3. An entity shall apply those amendments to business combinations for which the acquisition date is on or after the beginning of the first annual reporting period beginning on or after 1 January 2022. Earlier application is permitted if at the same time or earlier an entity also applies all the amendments made by Amendments to References to the Conceptual Framework in IFRS Standards, issued in March 2018.

- Extension of the Temporary Exemption from Applying IFRS 9 (Amendments to IFRS 4) - In response to concerns regarding temporary accounting mismatches and volatility, and increased costs and complexity, the Board issued amendments to IFRS 4 Insurance Contracts in 2017. The two optional solutions raised some considerations which required detailed analysis and management judgement. On the issue of IFRS 17 (Revised) Insurance Contracts in June 2020, the end date for applying the two options under the IFRS 4 amendments was extended to 1 January 2023, aligned with the effective date of IFRS 17.
- Classification of liabilities as current or non-current (Amendments to IAS 1) effective for the annual period beginning on or after 1 January 2022. These amendments in the standards have been added to further clarify when a liability is classified as current. The standard also amends the aspect of classification of liability as non-current by requiring the assessment of the entity's right at the end of the reporting period to defer the settlement of liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period. An entity shall apply those amendments retrospectively in accordance with IAS 8.

This caused an overall economic slowdown and varying degree of disruption to the Company including the suspension of production, sales and operations. However, the Government's initiative to subsequently relax the lockdown along with various other incentives to businesses helped in reviving the demand for paint from June 2020 onwards. The management of the Company has been regularly conducting in depth analysis and has assessed that there is no material impact of COVID - 19 on the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities as at December 31, 2020. Going forward, the management is taking all the required actions and will continue to monitor the potential impact and take all steps possible to mitigate any effects.

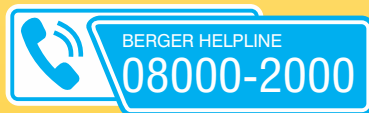
