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DIRECTORS' REVIEW

FOR THE NINE MONTHS PERIOD ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2022

We are pleased to present the operational and financial performance of the Company for the nine months period ended on 30th September 2022.

Dear Shareholders, calamitous floods and ongoing economic crisis have wrecked havoc in Pakistan with heavily saddening loss of life, crippling inflation, extreme volatility of Pak Rupee against USD and resultant slowing down of business cycle. Obviously, floods heavily affected agriculture with large portions of country still under water. Change in the attitude of farming community to substitute DAP with less expensive Urea and delay in announcement of Kissan Package by the GoP, further exacerbated by declining trend and uncertainty in the international DAP prices, resulted in 75% decline in domestic DAP sales volume, which significantly impacted our third quarter performance.

Though the Company achieved highest ever DAP production during the third quarter, the above-mentioned factors adversely impacted sales revenue, coupled with exchange loss of PKR 4.2 Billion, resulting in loss after tax of PKR 1.7 Billion (PKR 2.3 Billion profit after tax in SPLY).

In these challenging times the good news is that the company was able to maintain its planned production levels, which is higher than last year. During the nine months period under review, the Company achieved highest ever sales revenue of PKR 93.5 Billion, highest ever gross profit of PKR 17.9 Billion and highest ever operating profit of PKR 12.9 Billion, representing 37%, 24% and 33% increase respectively as compared with same period of last year (SPLY). The Company also achieved highest ever DAP production of 673KT for the period. For this best in class operational performance by the leadership and team, all through the nine months period, has ensured that company remained in the black, despite all the humongous external adversity in the third quarter, with a profit after tax of PKR. 1.7 Billion for the nine months period (PKR 6.2 Billion SPLY). We would like to point out to our shareholders that this profit is after accounting for exchange loss of PKR 7.2 Billion, finance cost of PKR 2.8 Billion and recently imposed super tax of PKR 2.7 Billion.

PLANT OPERATIONS

The plant operations remained consistent, safe and efficient. We successfully achieved 23.62 Million safe-man-hours in line with our commitment towards health and safety of our people. Highest ever third quarter DAP production of 224 KT also contributed to highest ever total DAP production of 673 KT for the nine months period as compared to 565 KT in SPLY, representing 1% and 19% increase respectively. Whereas, Urea production was 387 KT in comparison to 384 KT in SPLY

MARKET PERFORMANCE

DAP

International DAP market continues to be shrouded with uncertainty due to a downward price trend owing to high stocks, demand destruction and low sulphur prices.

Almost half of our domestic DAP market demand is met through local production by FFBL, which is dependent on imported Phosphoric Acid. Therefore, the prevailing international Phosphoric Acid price, record high Pak Rupee parity with US Dollar, freight cost and the Government policy to exempt sale of fertilizer from output tax resulted in quite a surge in price of DAP in domestic market.

Domestic DAP market is estimated to have declined by 41% during nine months period as compared to SPLY from 1,207 KT to 707 KT, primarily due to high pricing, unfavourable farm economics, a shift in the attitude of farming community to substitute highly subsidized Urea with costly but highly recommended DAP and flood water stagnation delaying sowing of Rabi crops.

The Company's sales dropped by only 26% from 515 KT to 381 KT in comparison to 41% fall in DAP market during the period. Consequently, the Company increased its market share by 11% to 54% on the back drop of overall disciplined marketing strategy.

Urea

Demand in domestic Urea market remained strong due to sentiment of short supply and increasing phosphatic fertilizer prices.

Domestic Urea market is estimated to have grown by 2% (from 4,656 KT to 4,767 KT) and its price witnessed an increase primarily to pass on the impact of input sales tax becoming cost of product due to exemption of sales tax on sale of fertilizer and increasing energy costs. FFBL's Urea sales slightly dropped by 4%, from 382 KT to 367 KT as compared to SPLY, primarily due to floods, causing supply chain disruption

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

We are pleased to present the financial results for the period as under:





The Company achieved ever highest sales revenue, gross profit and operating profit during the nine months period. Net profit has declined primarily due to foreign exchange loss of PKR 2.2 billion, finance cost of PKR 2.8 Billion and imposition of super tax of PKR 2.7 billion.

During the third quarter, the company suffered loss after tax due to significant decline in revenue by 41% as compared to SPLY and severe devaluation of Pak rupee resulting in exchange loss of PKR 4.2 billion.

On consolidated basis, during the nine months period, the Group achieved highest ever sales revenue of PKR 109 Billion, highest ever gross profit of PKR 24 Billion and highest ever operating profit of PKR 17.1 Billion, representing an increase of 33%, 21% and 25% respectively as compared with SPLY. Despite exchange loss and finance cost, as mentioned above, profit before tax achieved 9% growth from PKR 8.8 Billion to PKR 9.6 Billion. However, super tax charge of PKR 2.7 billion reduced the profit after tax by 40% to PKR 3.6 Billion from PKR 6 Billion in SPLY.

Fauji Foods Limited (FFL) registered a top line growth of 50% in current quarter as compared to same quarter last year and achieved 21% top line growth for the nine months period against SPLY. As an overall turnaround strategy, FFL is undergoing financial restructuring which shall be instrumental in improvement in business operation and margins.

Fauji Meat Limited has achieved a reduction in losses by 31% during nine months period as compared to SPLY based on optimization of its operations.

FFBL Power Company Limited operations were consistent, safe, efficient and profitable, compatible with profits of SPLY.

OUTLOOK

FFBL played its role in ensuring National Food Security with consistent DAP production throughout the period despite volatility in International DAP market. However, heavy monsoon rains, devastating floods and water stagnation delaying sowing of Rabi crops lead to less than expected offtake during the period. Though the management remains confident that the stock build up will be managed by end of this year, the plant operations and sales are highly dependent on availability of gas and Government's incentives to the farming community. It is high time that the Government acknowledges the significance of local DAP production which reduces reliance on the volatile international market, protects valued foreign exchange and comes to rescue in times of short supplies by ensuring reliably consistent production. It cannot be emphasized enough that import of fertilizer and low farm produce will exert pressure on already stressed foreign exchange reserves.

Through Finance Act 2022, the Government has granted input sales tax exemption on imports and not to local producer, and input sales tax has become cost of local DAP production. This discrimination has resulted in a severe competitive disadvantage to local production. We have engaged the Government and have requested immediate intervention and appropriate measures in order to address this economic injustice and protect local DAP production.

With unprecedented inflation, floods adversely impacting the farm economics and high DAP prices, a shift in the fertilizer consumption attitude of the farming community, by substituting DAP with less expensive and highly subsidized Urea, is a looming threat to crop yields of Pakistan. The Government must consider subsidizing DAP and timely announce support prices for important crops, which will promote the balanced use of fertilizer, ensuring balanced nutrients in soil and improve crop yields in line with international standards. The Government must take all stakeholders into confidence when taking policy decisions, particularly on pricing of gas for fertilizer sector. It must be taken into consideration that increase in gas price may exacerbate food inflation. Policies conducive for future investments in fertilizer sector will also go a long way to ensure food security of Pakistan.

Looking ahead, while considering the economic situation, volatility in International DAP market, domestic DAP demand and other market fundamentals, we expect a challenging time ahead. While we are determined to continue playing our part, the Government's role in such challenging times is of utmost significance for the fertilizer industry and agriculture sector of Pakistan.

We are determined to deliver on our commitment to feed the nation while operating responsibly.

1 THE COMPANY AND ITS OPERATIONS

Fauji Fertilizer Bin Qasim Limited ("the Company") is a public limited Company incorporated in Pakistan under the Companies Ordinance, 1984 (now replaced by the Companies Act, 2017 ("the Act") with effect from May 31, 2017). The shares of the Company are quoted on Pakistan Stock Exchange. The registered office of the Company is situated at FFBL Tower, C1/C2, Sector B, Jinnah Boulevard, DHA Phase II, Islamabad, Pakistan. The principal objective of the Company is manufacturing, purchasing and marketing of fertilizers. The Company commenced its commercial production effective January 1, 2000.

1.1 The Company's Gas Supply Agreement (GSA) with Sui Southern Gas Company Limited (SSGCL) expired on December 31, 2020. The Economic Coordination Committee (ECC) in its meeting dated February 03, 2021, as ratified by Federal Cabinet on February 09, 2021, approved allocation of indigenous natural gas for next five years on "as and when available basis" at existing gas prices till December 31, 2021. The Company's gas supply was resumed effective February 11, 2021 and a side letter was signed between FFBL and SSGCL to formalize arrangement regarding supply of gas which continue to apply to gas supply till date. Government of Pakistan is in the process of finalizing uniform gas price across the fertilizer sector. Management is confident that the formal addendum to GSA will be signed shortly.

2 RASIS OF PREPARATION

These condensed interim financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan for interim financial reporting. The accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan for interim financial reporting comprise of:

- International Accounting Standard (IAS) 34, Interim Financial Reporting, issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) as notified under the Companies Act, 2017; and
- Provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017.

Where the provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017 differ with the requirements of IAS 34, the provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017 have been followed.

The disclosures in these condensed interim financial statements do not include the information reported for complete annual financial statements and should therefore be read in conjunction with the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2021. The comparative Statement of Financial Position is extracted from the annual financial statements, as of December 31, 2021, whereas the Statement of Profit or Loss, the Statement of Comprehensive Income, the Statement of Cash Flows and the Statement of Changes in Equity are extracted from the un-audited condensed interim financial statements, for the period ended September 30, 2021.

These condensed interim financial statements are unaudited and are being submitted to the members, as required under Section 237 of the Companies Act, 2017, and the Listed Companies (Code of Corporate Governance) Regulations, 2019. The condensed interim consolidated financial statements of the Company are prepared separately.

In these condensed interim financial statements, the investments in subsidiaries and associates are accounted for on the basis of direct equity interest at cost, rather than on the basis of reported results.

3 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES, ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

The accounting policies and methods of computation adopted for the preparation of these condensed interim financial statements are similar to those applied in the preparation of the financial statements for the preceding year, ended December 31, 2021.

The significant estimates and judgements adopted for the preparation of these condensed interim financial statements are similar to those applied in the preparation of the financial statements for the preceding year, ended December 31, 2021 except for the following:

- a) Expected credit loss in respect of subsidy receivable Updation of discount rate and pattern of recovery resulting from changes in economic conditions and planned government outlays.
- b) Recoverable value of equity investment in Fauji Meat Limited (FML) Updation of discount rate resulting from changes in economic conditions and lapse of time.
- c) Recoverable value of equity investment in Fauji Foods Limited (FFL) Updation of discount rate and updated long term cashflow projections resulting from changes in economic conditions.

THE GROUP AND ITS OPERATIONS 1

Fauji Fertilizer Bin Qasim Limited is a public limited company incorporated in Pakistan under the Companies Ordinance, 1984 (now replaced by the Companies Act, 2017 with effect from May 31, 2017). The shares of the Company are quoted on Pakistan Stock Exchange (PSX). The registered office of FFBL is situated at FFBL Tower, C1/C2, Sector B, Jinnah Boulevard, DHA Phase II, Islamabad, Pakistan. The principal objective of FFBL is manufacturing, purchasing and marketing of fertilizers. FFBL commenced its commercial production effective January 01, 2000.

1.1 The Holdings Company's Gas Supply Agreement (GSA) with Sui Southern Gas Company Limited (SSGCL) expired on December 31, 2020. The Economic Coordination Committee (ECC) in its meeting dated February 03, 2021, as ratified by Federal Cabinet on February 09, 2021, approved allocation of indigenous natural gas for next five years on "as and when available basis" at existing gas prices till December 31, 2021. The Holding Company's gas supply was resumed effective February 11, 2021 and a side letter was signed between FFBL and SSGCL to formalize arrangement regarding supply of gas which continues to apply to gas supply till date. Government of Pakistan is in the process of finalizing uniform gas price across the fertilizer sector. Management is confident that the formal addendum to GSA will be signed shortly.

Fauji Fertilizer Bin Qasim Limited group comprises of Fauji Fertilizer Bin Qasim Limited (FFBL / the Holding Company) and its subsidiaries, Fauji Meat Limited (FML), FFBL Power Company Limited (FPCL) and Fauji Foods Limited (FFL) collectively referred as ("Group").

Fauji Meat Limited is a public limited company incorporated on September 05, 2013 in Pakistan under the Companies Ordinance, 1984 (now replaced by the Companies Act, 2017 with effect from May 31, 2017). The principal objectives of FML are to establish a meat abattoir unit for halal slaughtering of animals to obtain meat for local and export sale purposes.

FFBL Power Company Limited is a public limited company incorporated on June 27, 2014 in Pakistan under the Companies Ordinance, 1984 (now replaced by the Companies Act, 2017 with effect from May 31, 2017). The principal activity is generation and supply of electricity and all other forms of energy.

Fauji Foods Limited (FFL) was incorporated in Pakistan on September 26, 1966 as a public company and its shares are quoted on PSX. It is principally engaged in processing and sale of toned milk, milk powder, fruit juices, allied dairy and food products.

2 BASIS OF PREPARATION

These condensed interim consolidated financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan for interim financial reporting. The accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan for interim financial reporting comprise of:

- International Accounting Standard (IAS) 34, Interim Financial Reporting, issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) as notified under the Companies Act, 2017; and
- Provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017.

Where the provisions of and directives issued under the Companies Act. 2017 differ with the requirements of IAS 34, the provision of and directives issued under the Companies Act, 2017 have been followed.

The disclosures in these condensed interim consolidated financial statements do not include the information reported for complete annual consolidated financial statements and should therefore be read in conjunction with the consolidated financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2021. The comparative Consolidated Statement of Financial Position is extracted from the annual consolidated financial statements, as of December 31, 2021, whereas the Consolidated Statement of Profit or Loss and the Consolidated Statement of Other Comprehensive Income, the Consolidated Statement of Cash Flows and the Consolidated Statement of Changes in Equity are extracted from the unaudited condensed interim consolidated financial statements, for the period ended September 30, 2021.

These condensed interim consolidated financial statements are unaudited and are being submitted to the members, as required under Section 237 of the Companies Act, 2017, and the Listed Companies (Code of Corporate Governance) Regulations, 2019.

3 ACCOUNTING POLICIES, SIGNIFICANT ESTIMATES AND JUDGEMENTS

The accounting policies and methods of computation adopted for the preparation of these condensed interim consolidated financial statements are similar to those applied in the preparation of the consolidated financial statements for the preceding year, ended December 31, 2021.

The significant estimates and judgements adopted for the preparation of these condensed interim consolidated financial statements are similar to those applied in the preparation of the financial statements for the preceding year, ended December 31, 2021 except for the following:

- Expected credit loss in respect of subsidy receivable — Updation of discount rate and pattern of recovery resulting from changes in economic conditions and planned government outlays.

FOR THE PERIOD ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 2022

4 IMPACT OF COVID-19

On January 31, 2020, the World Health Organization (WHO) announced a global health emergency due to Corona virus. Because of the rapid increase in exposure globally, on March 11, 2020, the WHO classified the COVID-19 outbreak as a pandemic.

The Government of Pakistan has from time to time imposed temporary restrictions on movement. The Group has adopted the required regulations.

5 SHARE CAPITAL

5.1 Group consists of following subsidiary companies:

The condensed interim financial statements of subsidiary companies have been consolidated on line by line basis. The carrying value of investments held by the Holding Company is eliminated against the subsidiaries' share capital and pre-acquisition reserves. All material intercompany balances and transactions have been eliminated.

5.2 Pursuant to the approval in Board meeting of the Holding Company, held on January 26, 2022, the Holding Company communicated its intention, to the Board of Directors of Fauji Meat Limited (FML), to exercise the option to convert its sub-ordinated loan and related accrued mark-up, amounting to Rs. 7,000,000 thousand and Rs. 581,094 thousand, respectively, into 758,109,400 ordinary shares of FML, at their face value, resulting in total holding of shares to 1,446,609,400 (95.07%). This conversion of sub-ordinated loan and related accrued mark-up is recorded at fair value after netting-off of ECL amounting to Rs. 3,549,134 thousand. Accordingly, FML, after completing the necessary regulatory requirements and pursuant to approval of its members, has allocated 758,109,400 ordinary shares to the Holding Company, on March 25, 2022.
