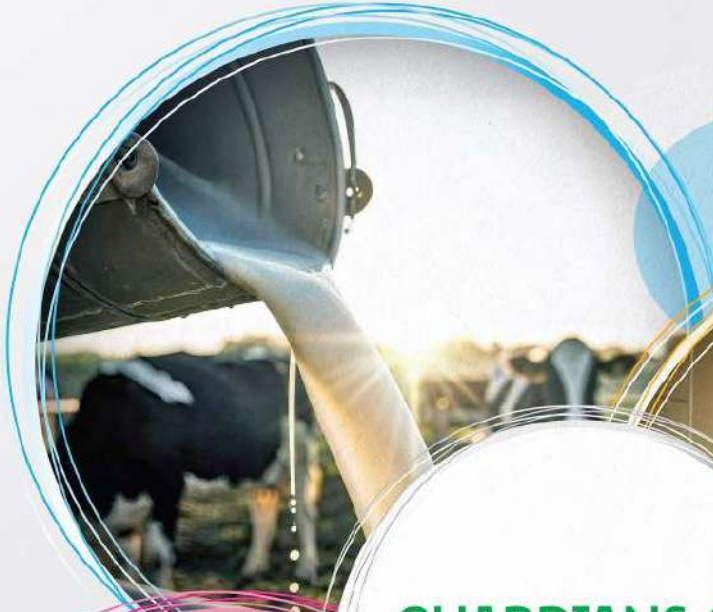

DIRECTORS' REPORT

The Directors of FrieslandCampina Engro Pakistan Limited (a majority-owned subsidiary of FrieslandCampina Pakistan Holdings B.V.) (the "Company") are pleased to submit the report along with the condensed financial information of the Company for the quarter ended 31st March 2026.

OPERATING ENVIRONMENT

The macroeconomic environment in Pakistan showed meaningful improvement in 2025 and beginning of 2026. Inflation continuing its downward trend and successive policy rate reductions provided relief on financing costs. The Pakistani Rupee also remained relatively stable, contributing to a more predictable operating environment.

However, the conflict in the Middle East from March 2026 has introduced uncertainty, with rising oil prices adding to costs across the value chain. These dynamics will be weighing heavily on category affordability and demand.

BUSINESS PERFORMANCE OVERVIEW

In the first quarter of 2026, the Company delivered net sales growth of 10.4% versus the same period last year (PKR 28.7 billion vs PKR 26 billion). Continued emphasis on in-market execution, selective brand investment and route-to-market fundamentals supported the Company's commercial performance during the quarter. The Company maintained its focus on cost discipline and operational efficiency across the value chain, resulting in gross margin increase of 280 bps versus the same period last year and operating profit increase of 43% versus the same period last year.

The packaged milk market continues to operate below its pre-tax levels, driven by the 18% sales tax imposed on UHT milk in July 2024. The uneven playing field versus loose milk, which remains outside the tax net, continues to suppress volumes in the formal dairy sector. The Company continued to actively engage with relevant government stakeholders to advocate for equitable taxation, underscoring the adverse impact of the current tax regime on public health, farmer livelihoods, and the documented dairy economy.

DAIRY-BASED PRODUCTS SEGMENT

Revenue from the Dairy-Based Products segment stood at PKR 25.5 billion, representing a 8.2% growth compared to the same period last year. The Company maintained investment behind the 'Khalis Kay Rakhwalay' campaign for Olper's UHT across TV, digital, PR, and in-store touchpoints, reinforcing the brand's purity credentials with consumers. Olper's Cream and Flavored Milk delivered volume growth during the quarter, reflecting the Company's strategy to drive value-added products and broaden its portfolio mix

FROZEN DESSERTS SEGMENT

Omore sustained strong growth momentum, achieving 31% revenue growth versus last year and reaching PKR 3.2 billion in revenue. This performance was driven by Bricks renovations, including 600ml plain variants and Festive Value-Added Bricks and Tubs. This was further amplified by the “Har Table Ko Miley Wow Bharay Desserts” campaign across TV, Digital, and E-Commerce during Ramzan and Eid, driving festive excitement and visibility.

The 18% sales tax on packaged UHT milk continues to represent a structural challenge for the formal dairy sector, suppressing volumes and sustaining the price gap with unregulated loose milk. The Company will continue to engage with relevant stakeholders and advocate for equitable taxation that is aligned with global benchmarks and supports the growth of Pakistan's documented dairy economy.

The Company will continue to monitor regional uncertainty and respond in a manner that is best for its consumers and farmers, while delivering value to its shareholders. The Company will also continue to drive efficiencies across its operations and optimizing investments to enhance overall financial health.

Leveraging its global expertise and 150 years of heritage, FCEPL remains committed to the highest standards of hygiene, food safety and sustainability and providing safe, affordable and nourishing dairy products to millions of Pakistanis, every day.

1. LEGAL STATUS AND OPERATIONS

- 1.1 FrieslandCampina Engro Pakistan Limited (the Company), is a public listed company incorporated in Pakistan, under the repealed Companies Ordinance, 1984 (now the Companies Act, 2017) on April 26, 2005, and its shares are quoted on the Pakistan Stock Exchange. The Company is a subsidiary of FrieslandCampina Pakistan Holdings B.V. (the Holding Company) which is a subsidiary of Zuivelcoöperatie FrieslandCampina UA (the Ultimate Parent Company). The registered office of the Company is situated at 5th Floor, the Harbour Front Building, Plot No. HC-3, Block-4, Scheme No. 5, Clifton, Karachi.
- 1.2 The principal activity of the Company is to manufacture, process and sell dairy based products and frozen desserts. The Company also owns and operates a dairy farm.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

- 2.1 These condensed interim financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting and reporting standards as applicable in Pakistan for interim financial reporting. The accounting and reporting standards applicable on the Company in Pakistan for interim financial reporting comprise of:
- International Accounting Standard 34, 'Interim Financial Reporting' (IAS 34), issued by International Accounting Standards Board (IASB) as notified under the Companies Act, 2017 (the Act); and
 - Provisions of and directives issued under the Act.

Where the provisions of and directives issued under the Act differ with the requirements of IAS 34, the provisions of and directives issued under the Act have been followed.

- 2.2 These condensed interim financial statements do not include all the information required for annual financial statements and therefore should be read in conjunction with the audited financial statements of the Company for the year ended December 31, 2025.
- 2.3 The preparation of these condensed interim financial statements in conformity with the above requirements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgment in the process of applying the Company's accounting policies. Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectation of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

During preparation of these condensed interim financial statements, the significant judgments made by the management in applying the Company's accounting policies and the key sources of estimation and uncertainty are the same as those that were applied to the financial statements of the Company for the year ended December 31, 2025, unless otherwise specified.

3. MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND CHANGES THEREIN

- 3.1 The material accounting policies and the methods of computation adopted in the preparation of these condensed interim financial statements are same as those applied in the preparation of the financial statements of the Company for the year ended December 31, 2025.
- 3.2 There are certain standards and amendments to accounting and reporting standards that are not yet effective and are considered either not to be relevant or to have any significant impact on the Company's financial reporting and, therefore, have not been disclosed in these condensed interim financial statements.

9.1 The facilities for short term running finance available from various banks, which represent the aggregate sale price of all mark-up arrangements, at March 31, 2026 amounts to Rs.11,500,000 (December 31, 2025: Rs. 11,500,000). The unutilized balance against these facilities as at March 31, 2026 was Rs. 7,621,375 (December 31, 2025: Rs. 10,753,904). The rates of mark-up on these finances are KIBOR based and range from 10.58% to 11.31% (December 31, 2025: 11.15% to 13.81%) per annum. These facilities are secured by way of floating charge upon all the present and future current assets of the Company.

9.2 The facilities for opening letters of credit and bank guarantees as at March 31, 2026 amounts to Rs. 27,300,000 (December 31, 2025: Rs. 27,300,000), of which the amount remaining unutilized as at March 31, 2026 was Rs.24,045,624 (December 31, 2025: Rs.23,830,835).

10. CONTINGENCIES AND COMMITMENTS

There are no significant changes in the status of the matters disclosed in notes 13, 25 and 33 of the financial statements of the Company for the year ended December 31, 2025, except for the following:

- Commitments in respect of capital expenditure contracted for but not incurred as at March 31, 2026 amounts to Rs. 915,575 (December 31, 2025: Rs. 980,038).
- Commitments in respect of purchase of certain commodities as at March 31, 2026 amounts to Rs. 1,167,829 (December 31, 2025: Rs. 1,395,315).
- On December 18, 2024, the Company received an order from Competition Commission of Pakistan (CCP), imposing a penalty of Rs. 75,000 in respect of Company's marketing activities relating to one of its brands. The Company filed an appeal with the Competition Appellate Tribunal against the aforementioned order, which has been partly allowed by way of the Tribunal's order dated January 14, 2026, whereby the penalty amount has been reduced to Rs. 15,000 however the observations vis a vis disclaimer remain the same. While the CCP has effected recovery of the penalty amount, the Company, based on opinion of its legal advisor, has filed an appeal before the Supreme Court of Pakistan.
- The Deputy Commissioner Inland Revenue (DCIR) passed an order on October 03, 2024 for the period December 2021 to June 2022 alleging wrongful adjustments of certain input taxes thereby creating demand of Rs. 247,017 including penalty. The Company filed an appeal before the Appellate Tribunal Inland Revenue (ATIR) against the impugned order. During the period, the ATIR passed an order dated March 16, 2026 whereby it annulled the order passed by the DCIR and remanded back the matter for afresh adjudication. No remand back proceedings have been initiated by DCIR to date.
- The Federal Board of Revenue had issued a show cause notice alleging non charging of sales tax on bulk sales of certain specified products for the period July 2024 to December 2024, which the Company had treated as exempt. Subsequently, the DCIR passed an order dated February 03, 2026 raising a sales tax demand of Rs. 193,323 including penalty in respect of certain products. The Company has filed an appeal against the said order before the Commissioner Inland Revenue Appeals, which is currently pending adjudication. The Company, based on the opinion of its tax consultant, is confident of a favorable outcome of the appeal.

- On February 26, 2025 DCIR passed an order for the recovery of super tax for tax year 2023 of Rs. 292,024. The Company has filed an appeal before the (ATIR) against the order. During the period, ATIR issued an order dated February 12, 2026 whereby it upheld the levy considering the judgement of Federal Constitutional Court (refer note 33.1.1 of the financial statements of the Company for the year ended December 31, 2025). However, ATIR set aside the order of DCIR and directed it to recompute the amount owing to certain computational errors. The Company carries adequate provision in this respect.
- On February 6, 2026 DCIR passed an order for the recovery of super tax for tax year 2025 of Rs. 495,065. The Company filed an appeal before the ATIR whereby it pleaded that liability of super tax be adjusted from the pending tax refunds. The appeal is currently pending adjudication. The Company also carries a provision in this respect.

آپریٹنگ ماحول

پاکستان میں معاشی ماحول نے 2025 اور 2026 کے آغاز میں نمایاں بہتری دکھائی۔ مہنگائی میں مسلسل کمی کارجمان برقرار رہا جبکہ پالیسی ریٹ میں مسلسل کمی سے فنانسنگ لاگت میں ریلیف ملا۔ پاکستانی روپیہ بھی نسبتاً مستحکم رہا، جس سے کاروباری ماحول زیادہ قابل پیش گوئی بنا۔

تاہم مارچ 2026 سے مشرق وسطیٰ میں جاری تنازع نے غیر یقینی صورتحال پیدا کر دی ہے، جبکہ تیل کی بڑھتی قیمتوں نے پوری ویلیو چین میں لاگت میں اضافہ کر دیا ہے۔ یہ عوامل کیمپنی کی استطاعت اور طلب پر نمایاں دباؤ ڈالیں گے۔

کاروباری کارکردگی کا جائزہ

ڈیری پر مبنی مصنوعات کا شعبہ

ڈیری بیسڈ پروڈکٹس سیگمنٹ سے آمدنی 25.5 ارب روپے رہی، جو گزشتہ سال کے اسی عرصے کے مقابلے میں 8.2 فیصد اضافہ ظاہر کرتی ہے۔ کمپنی نے Olper's UHT کے لیے خالص کے رکھوالے، مہم میں ٹی وی، ڈیجیٹل، پی آر اور اسٹوریج سرمایہ کاری جاری رکھی، جس سے صارفین کے ساتھ برانڈ کی خالص کی شناخت مزید مضبوط ہوئی۔ اولپرز کریم اور فلیورڈ ملک نے سہ ماہی کے دوران حجم میں اضافہ ریکارڈ کیا، جو ویلیو ایڈڈ مصنوعات کو فروغ دینے اور پورٹ فولیو مکس کو وسعت دینے کی کمپنی کی حکمت عملی کی عکاسی کرتا ہے۔
